Pourquoi je suis comme je suis (la suite...)

Inspired by detective novels, Nicolas Mavrikakis presents his father's life. The exhibition takes place in Mavrikakis' office, and will conclude with a looped performance involving many actors – an appropriation of Jean Cocteau's theatre piece, *The Human Voice* (1930).

La mort en P. – Pourquoi je suis comme je suis (la suite...), is the second part of the Why I Am The Way I Am performance installation by artist Nicolas Mavrikakis. The first part was presented in 2012 by Joyce Yahouda, curator / director of Joyce Yahouda Gallery. For many days, Mavrikakis showcased his own mother. On the last day, the exhibition culminated with a performance by the artist, himself.

Joyce Yahouda - Curator

In 2011, Nicolas Mavrikakis, mainly known as a curator and art critic, approached me to express his desire to exhibit an art piece. As an independent curator, I insisted that he follow through and affirmed my interest in supporting him with his project.

In 2012, the artist proposed the performance installation Why I Am The Way I Am. I was delighted with the unexpected and unsettling work!

Presented at Joyce Yahouda Gallery in 2012, Why I Am The Way I Am consisted of exhibiting the artist's mother. Mrs. Mavrikakis settled into one of the gallery spaces, where she received visitors and answered their numerous questions. On the last day of the event, Nicolas Mavrikakis' mother was absent. It was her son's turn to take the stage. Through Nicolas's words and gestures, Mrs. Mavrikakis seemingly appeared, as she would be seen through her son's eyes. Did this constitute a homage or condemnation? Probably both.

This time, in 2019, through La mort en P – Pourquoi je suis comme je suis (la suite...), Nicolas Mavrikakis addresses his mysterious and charismatic father, Mr. Mavrikakis. This second performance piece takes the form of a police investigation, which will unfold in an office building in downtown Montréal. Through staging an enigma – using real and fictitious artifacts, objects from daily life, painting, photography, video, and sound – we are guided in a doubt-filled universe.

The event will conclude with a looped appropriation of Jean Cocteau's theatre piece, The Human Voice (1930). Performed by many actors, it serves as a metaphor for difficult romantic break ups and communication difficulties. Nicolas Mavrikakis will be among the actors. This highly narrative performance piece, and source of multiple interpretations, addresses the complexities of father-son relationships, while also exploring the subject of death and the idea of being at peace with the past.

He's baaaaack!!


